



ELIGIBILITY

Harding Place provides a supportive environment for single, homeless Greene County residents who are unemployed or underemployed, and are interested in working toward self-sufficiency.

Even those who've been involved with the criminal justice system or have shown a dependence on social services providers are eligible to participate as long as their annual income is below 35% of the Greene County area median income.

All that we ask is that you abide by a month to month lease agreement, and actively participate in comprehensive case management designed to give you basic skills and become eligible for job opportunities.

Your motivation and willingness to cooperate with us are the keys to your acceptance.

Community Action Partnership is here to help connect you with a full range of applicable social services in order to get you out of homelessness and into a safe, secure, stable living situation.

Harding Place counselors will provide programs to grow the skills needed to end the cycle of poverty and give you the confidence to succeed.

Our goal is to stabilize your situation and give you a foundation to build a supportive, sustainable life on your own.

Our program incorporates:

Living Skills

Money management and financial literacy.

Household management skills.

Health and wellness programs including diet, fitness and healthy living.

Tenant landlord relationships.

Counseling and therapy.

Substance abuse programs.

Housing Basics

Harding Place is fully furnished.

Graduates will have access to household basics for their transition.

Assistance in finding permanent solutions and connecting you with programs to ease the transition.

Job Training

Interviewing techniques and resume prep.

Time management and goal setting.


Wardrobe for dress for successful interviews.

The program is designed to have you on your own in under a year, however, depending on your progress the timeline is flexible.



Harding Place is named after Jack Harding, the former Director of the Greene County Department of Job and Family Services who saw a need for emergency housing for the homeless in Greene County.

What used to amount to a weekend in a motel or a referral to shelters in Dayton, is now a comprehensive shelter with wrap-around services to help end homelessness in Greene County.
